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A FIERO IS REBORN **Aaron Ordway's Miracle Car**

Aaron Ordway bought this '88 GT, his first Fiero, in May 2005.



But the history of this car begins well before that when the previous owner was hit by a truck in 1999 (the GT was considered a total). However, he had become very attached to the car – he wanted to have it rebuilt anyway!



Therefore, the black GT was sent from Seattle to the Fiero Factory in Alabama, as they had a low mileage black '88 coupe with a perfect chassis (but poor body panels). They did a ground-up restoration using that chassis. Two 1/2 months later, it looked like this.



Although Aaron bought this car on Memorial Day weekend in 2005 with the sole intent to do an engine swap, the swap wasn't started until May 2007. The brand new crate engine is from a 1995 Grand Prix GTP. The heads were ported and polished, and a lightened set of lifters were installed along with a newer style intake manifold. The engine was fitted with a home-built intake using a Northstar throttle body and huge 42.5 lb injectors. He then built equal length headers to feed the air to water inter-cooled, dual ball bearing, Garrett turbocharger.



Exiting the turbo Aaron built his own 3" exhaust utilizing Mercedes AMG tips. Aaron wanted to retain the stock Getrag 5 speed manual transmission, so, a custom 8 lb billet aluminum flywheel and SPEC stage 3 Kevlar clutch were fitted.



With the exception of the exhaust tips the car looks completely factory stock. While he has updated the factory gray leather interior a bit using gauge overlays, and improved the sound system with a Kenwood double-din MP3 player – only an avid Fiero enthusiast would be able to tell that this shiny black beauty isn't factory stock. That is, until he starts the engine!

What a sleeper! Once Aaron finishes tuning it, this special car will see plenty of time on the dyno and at the quarter mile, so stay tuned!

PERFORMANCE CORNER

Before we can talk about improving performance, we need to determine what it really is. Is it going fast in a straight line or at high rates of speed? Or maybe cornering hard without drama, or just getting better mileage? Well, this author thinks that performance is any or all of these, depending on what each individual owner demands from his car.

Let's take a moment to discuss making a Fiero go faster in a straight line or obtaining higher rates of speed. This takes power - and there are as many thoughts on how to get more power as there are

Fiero owners. It could be through engine swaps, super or turbo charging, "beefing" the stock engine, or even simply giving the car a good tune-up.

What about handling? No easier to detail than increasing power was - with one exception. Any Fiero will handle better by installing better tires! But it can progress from that to installing or upgrading a rear sway bar, possibly adjustable shocks, or

spring swaps, even entire suspension re-engineering (again, depending on the owners tastes).

And with the price of gas being what it is,, I think mileage is on all our minds.

CHECK YOUR FRONT BALL JOINTS

We've all heard about how important it is to have good front ball joints. But how do we know if they are bad?

To find out if you really need ball joints, jack up each side in turn, using the car's side post jack. Then, use a pry bar under the lower A-arm to pick up each wheel. Any movement of the lower A-arm after contact and before the wheel moves

indicates a bad lower ball joint or pivot bushing.

To check the upper ball joint, Shake the wheel in and out by grabbing it top and bottom.

Then check the rod ends by shaking the wheel at the 9 and 3 o'clock positions. Movement indicates need to repair or

replace.

Wheels should be pointed straight ahead while you are doing these checks.
